




National to Local

- MUST be challenged with critical thinking.
- Need for Evidence based policy
- Need for Deliberative Democracy

Challenges to Policy Change



Administrative concerns / resistance

- We've always done it this way
- We don't have the staff / skills / resources
- Potential domino effect on other policies
 - eg increase minimum wage => change PRSI and med card limits.

Time constraints

- We need it NOW
- The Dept / EU say we have to decide next week

Ideology

Our belief system says so that's what we do

Vested Interests

- Formal lobbying
- Informal Golden Circles

- Proactive rather than reactive

- Achieving real change


Challenges

- Time consuming
- Needs skills and some resources
- Paralysis by analysis

Possible Policy Objectives




- Placing an issue on the Policy Agenda.
- Policy Development
- Policy Adoption / Blocking eg by Councillors
- Policy Implementation Proper implementation of a policy, along with the <u>funding</u>, <u>resources</u>, <u>or quality</u> <u>assurance</u> to ensure it.
- Policy Monitoring and Evaluation Tracking a policy to ensure it is implemented properly and achieves its intended impacts.
- Policy Maintenance Preventing cuts or other negative changes to a policy.



Defining the path



- What is the problem / issue (A)?
- What is your vision / Theory of Change (C)
- What is needed to make it happen

A) Defining the current reality



Be specific and evidence based

- What is it?
- What causes it?
- Why is it an issue?
- Who is it an issue for?
- How big an issue is it?
- What research and evidence exists about it?
- What are the key policies / practices impacting on the issue?
- What are the impacts of those policies (Intended and unintended)?
- How are decisions made in this area?
- What are the root causes: social, cultural, political, economic?




Where are we and why are we here?

C:Defining the change you want to see



- Reflecting values of human dignity, respect, equality, justice, sustainability etc
 - What do you want to see in the long term?
 - How would the lives of people in your target group be different?
 - Who might lose out?
 - How would society benefit?
 - How does that translate into practicalities and policy?
- Short, clear statement

Construct alternative policies



NEW PARADIGM AHEAL

Look for alternative options

- Parallel situation / pilot project/existing
- New ideas
- Proposals from other groups / countiles / countiles

Project the outcomes / impacts

- For Target Group
- For all stakeholders including wider society
- What knock on impact would it have for other policies?

Budget

- Costs
- Sources of Finance

Evaluating the alternatives



- Are they realistic? Workable? Possible in current reality.
- What is the realistic timeframe?
- What are the benefits and to whom?
- What's the cost benefit analysis / social return on investment?
- Is there a realistic funding source?
- Does the policy/solution you are proposing have influential opposition or support? How powerful are those influencers? Can you address their concerns?

Who are the Target Audiences?



- Who are potential allies?
- Who is supportive but needs to be convinced?
- Who has the power to make it happen?
- Who is "on the fence" with the inertia to slow progress
- Who has the power to stop it happening?
- What motivates all of the above?
- Tailor your message to different groups

Talk to people (both supporters and opponents)

Listen to people (both supporters and opponents)

Build alliances

Be willing to compromise (?)

- Use research and analysis
- Use case studies / Personal stories from target groups

Where

- Boards and Committees with PPN reps
- Consultations / Submissions
- Public Meetings
- Direct Lobbying
- Presenting research
- Media

Monitoring and evaluation



- Continue to monitor research and develop your own research

- Does it need to be reviewed?
